Rowan University Academic Integrity Summary Table for Instructors

- 1. When you suspect a violation of the Academic Integrity policy, carefully review the <u>Academic Integrity Policy</u> and associated documents, as well as the FAQs on the <u>Academic Integrity Website</u> (go.rowan.edu/academicintegrity). Note that for minor infractions likely due to ignorance or inexperience (such as inappropriate paraphrasing or incomplete citation), instructors have the ability to use discretion to provide the student with an educational intervention (such as the opportunity to review appropriate practice and then resubmit an appropriate assignment) rather than filing a report of an alleged violation.
- 2. If you determine that a violation has likely occurred, complete the Guide for Academic Integrity Violation Meetings.
- 3. Attempt to meet with the student to provide notice of and discuss the alleged violation. Provide the student with a copy of the Guide.
- 4. Taking into consideration circumstances, context, and presumed intent—and employing the chart below—use your best judgment to determine where an alleged violation fits. There is overlap among the categories.

An asterisk (*) denotes the maximum penalty that may be applied. Sanctions shown in italics are determined by the Academic Integrity Review Board, but are provided here for your information. You do not need to recommend sanctions for Level 3 and 4 violations. At all levels, additional and/or lesser sanctions may be applied at the discretion of the instructor, the Academic Integrity Review Board, or the Office of the Provost.

5. Complete and submit the Report of an Academic Integrity Violation (RAIV) (now an online form) and documentation of the alleged violation to the Office of the Provost. The table below identifies jurisdictions for each violation level.

Additional Notes:

- All violations of academic integrity, especially when a grade reduction is made as a result of the violation, must be reported to the Provost's Office and follow the RAIV procedures. The exception is when an incident is deemed by the instructor to be best addressed as an educational intervention to increase the student's knowledge and ability for appropriate practice (see Section V. 3. Academic Integrity Educational Intervention).
- While it is normally the instructor who reports and acts on an alleged academic integrity violation, other instructors, staff members, or students may, and should, report such violations.
- Repeat offenses are considered to be more serious and will be categorized by the Academic Integrity Review Board as higher-level violations.
